

Child Migrants in the U.S.

A lesson plan designed by Chelsea Collins

Through close reading and reflection, this lesson gives students the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of modern-day migration.

Directions:

HOMEWORK

Students should analyze an excerpt from "The Circuit" by Francisco Jimenez. Specifically, students should focus on the conflict, as well as how characters respond to developments in the plot.

CLASS 1

Step 1: Read closely


- a. Students should read "Central American children heading to U.S. to escape danger" independently, showing evidence of a close reading by marking up the text with thoughtful questions, comments, or areas of confusion.
- b. Students should complete the first two response questions on the reflection worksheet.

Step 2: Dig deeper

- a. In teams of 3-4, students should discuss their close reading notes and response questions.
- b. Students should finish the response questions as a team.

Step 3: Reflect

- a. Post images related to the topic around the room. Then, have students complete a Gallery Walk to make connections between the images and the text. Students should independently jot down their reactions, connections, and reflections as they move around the room.
- b. Students should discuss their reflections with their team members.
- c. Groups should report out and engage in a whole-group discussion around the topic.
- d. Individually, students should write down comparisons between the images, the article, and "The Circuit."
